Making an appointment with Immigration Service Delivery (ISD) – for Non-EU students

- If you are a resident of **Dublin, Kildare, Meath, Wicklow, Cork, or Limerick** and need to register your permission for the **first time**, you can book an appointment by calling the provided number. (This number can also be used to reschedule or cancel appointments.)
- Freephone: **1800 800 630** (Irish phone number required).
- Make sure to have your **passport details** and a **valid email address** ready when speaking to the customer service representative.
- Operators are available Monday to Friday, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., to assist you.

Day of your ISD appointment

- Valid Passport
- Proof of Registration*
- Proof of Fees Paid*
- All non-VISA required students, you must show you have direct access of €4,500 (bank statement)
- Proof of Health Insurance, policy document is required
- €300 Fee (No cash accepted. Credit card or debit card)

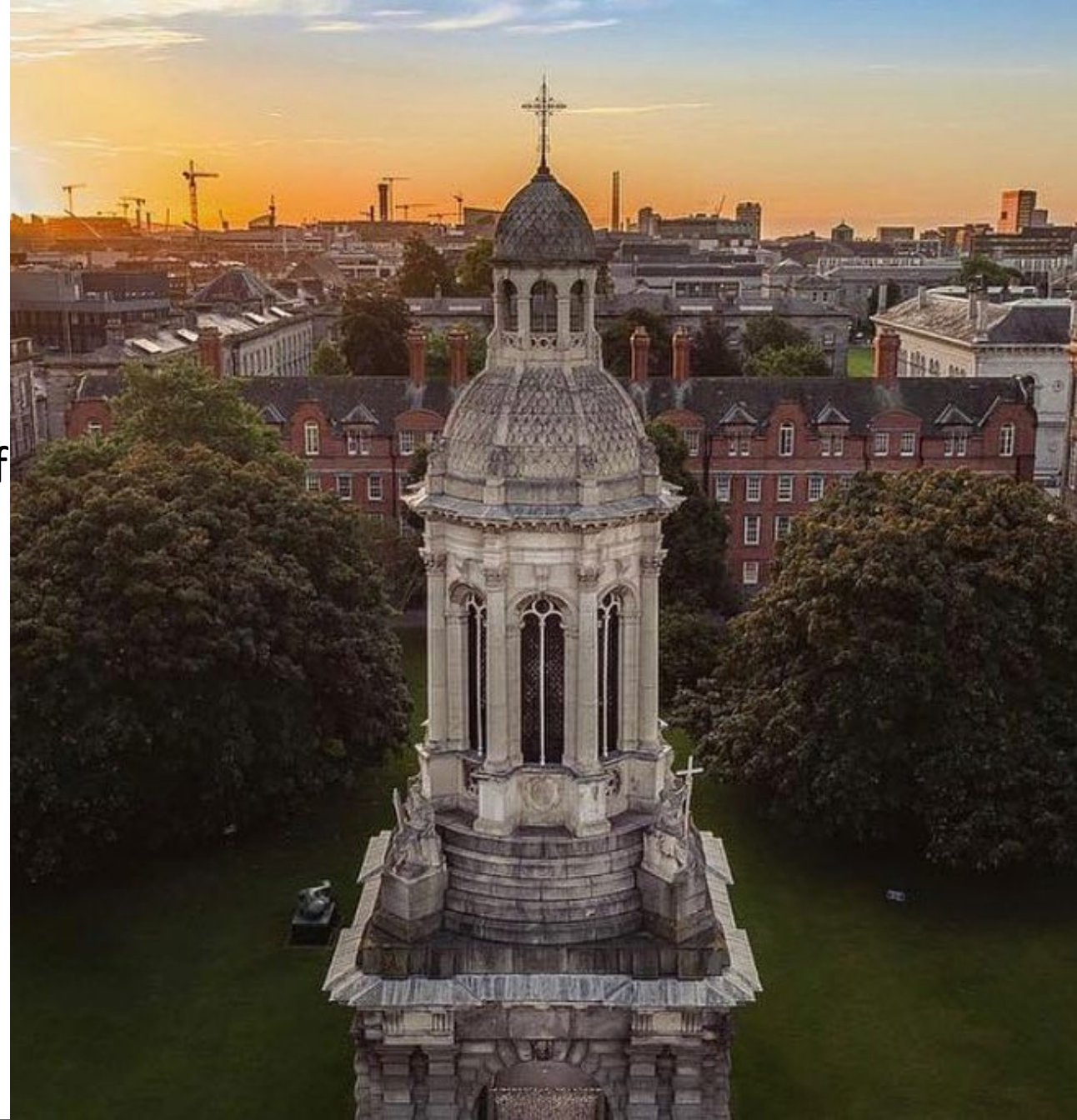
*Proof of registration and proof of fees paid are in the same letter and can be generated and printed from your student portal (my.tcd.ie)

Proof of Registration Letter

- Log on to my.tcd.ie portal
- Click on the 'Registration tab' for options of letters to print
- Click on 'Confirmation of Registration'
- Go to 'Intray' on the home tab.
- Your letter will be in your 'New Intray' or 'All intray messages'
- Click 'Proof of Registration' to open and print the file.



Students under 18

- Students under the age of 18 must have their guardian present at first registration.
- Guardians must provide:
 1. Their own passport
 2. Written authorization from the student's parents (proof of guardianship)
 3. Proof of residence in Ireland
- The €300 fee is waived for these students.

If you don't have anyone in Ireland who can act as your guardian, Trinity recommends using a guardianship service. You can find more information here: www.godsil.ie



Immigration Registration (Outside Dublin and others)

- Students living **outside** of Dublin, Kildare, Meath, Wicklow, Cork or Limerick must register with their nearest registration office
- Regional registration offices are managed by An Garda Síochána
- Same documents required as with registration in Dublin
- Students are to contact their local Garda Station to confirm requirements and check opening hours

Change of the student status

- Non-EU/EEA/Swiss/UK students transitioning to **off-books or other statuses** may risk losing their right to remain in Ireland, as immigration registration is tied to student status.
- Students are strongly encouraged to use the immigration advice service provided by Trinity Global at the **Global Room**.
- This service offers detailed information on how changes to your student status may affect your **immigration status**.



Entry visas for other countries

If you are planning to take a trip outside of Ireland:

- Check the visa requirements of the country you are going to
- Ensure you allow sufficient time to apply for your visa,
- Check if there are travel advisories before you travel: www.ireland.ie/en/dfa/overseas-travel/



Schengen Visa

- 29 European countries, make sure you apply to the right embassy
- Requirements, check with the Embassy you're applying to, most common documents required include:
- Passport, Passport photo, Application form, Application fee, IRP card valid for at least 3 months after your trip, travel medical insurance, Proof of registration, Bookings (flights and accommodation), Bank statement etc.

Make the Schengen Visa Appointment in advance!



UK Visa (incl. Northern Ireland)

Complete online application form, answer all questions, pay the fees, make an appointment with TLS visa centre, attend the appointment for fingerprint and photo in the visa centre, wait for the visa.

Documents needed (uploading):

- Travel insurance
- Bank statement (6 months)
- Proof of registration (from my.tcd.ie or Academic Registry)
- Proof of address
- Scan of passport biometric page etc.

If you are a visa-required national for the UK, it is essential to be aware that you will need to obtain a separate UK visa specifically for entry into Northern Ireland.

4. Opening a Student Bank Account

All non-EU students need to open a bank account
Necessary to have Irish bank account for
immigration purposes

Banking Options:

- **Allied Irish Bank (AIB):** www.aib.ie

- **Bank of Ireland (BOI):** www.boi.ie
- **Money Jar:** <https://moneyjar.world/> (Money Jar - Student Onboarding TCD code 89610) * (Can open before arrival and permanent Ireland address is not required)



Opening Requirements

Documents that may be required to open a bank account:

- Proof of address in Ireland: Letter can be obtained from Academic Registry.
- Proof of ID: Passport.
- Bank Statement from your home country
- Other documents depending on each bank and students' nationality



Note

- Allow time for your account to become active
- If you will be under 18 at the time of opening your bank account, you will need a guardian to accompany you to open a bank account
- When securing private accommodation, most letting agents and landlords will accept cash or bank draft (which you can obtain with a foreign debit card or cash in an Irish bank) for the first month's rent and security deposit, as long as you set up direct debit from an Irish account as soon as possible after opening your new bank account



5. Non-EU student work rights

- **Non-EU Students** attending a full degree full-time course with an Irish Residence Permit (IRP) card are entitled to take up casual employment
 - Non-EU citizens must register with Immigration Service Delivery (ISD) before commencing employment
 - 20 hours during term time, and 40 hours during December 15 to January 15 and June 1 to September 30 only
 - The right to work lapses automatically on expiry of immigration permission
- **EU passport-holders:** Have the same rights to work as Irish citizens
- **Note:** Single semester Non-EU study abroad students are not permitted to work in Ireland.



How to get a PPS number

- A Personal Public Service (PPS) number is a unique reference number that everyone who works in Ireland must have
- It ensures that you can be registered with the Irish taxation authorities, known as the [Revenue Commissioners](#)
- Students will receive a PPS number only when you can show you have an offer to take up employment or need it to deal with a "[specified body](#)"
- To get a PPS number, you can apply online via email to the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection: <https://www.gov.ie/en/service/12e6de-get-a-personal-public-service-pps-number/>



What you need...

- A completed [application form](#) for the PPS Number.
- Evidence of your identity (passport)
- Evidence of why you need a PPS number allocated (e.g. job offer)
- Proof of your address. (Letter from Academic Registry or bank statement)

What is SafeZone?

This Trinity App increases the security and safety of students and staff while in a Trinity location. It provides immediate access to Trinity resources to provide assistance in cases of emergencies or when an alert is raised.

What is SafeZone used for?

SafeZone enables you to raise alerts (by pressing the emergency button on the App) or seek assistance when onsite in Trinity. Once an alert is raised, the user's location is shared with our security team who then respond. The App allows users to check-in for specific time periods and if they do not check-out within that period, an alert is automatically sent to security.

Further functionality will be delivered over the coming months, including sending Trinity notifications to our SafeZone registered students and staff.

How do I access SafeZone?

Just download the SafeZone app from the iOS or Android App stores, enter your TCD username and password, complete the registration form and you are good to go. You can opt to check in automatically (recommended) or manually check-in when required.

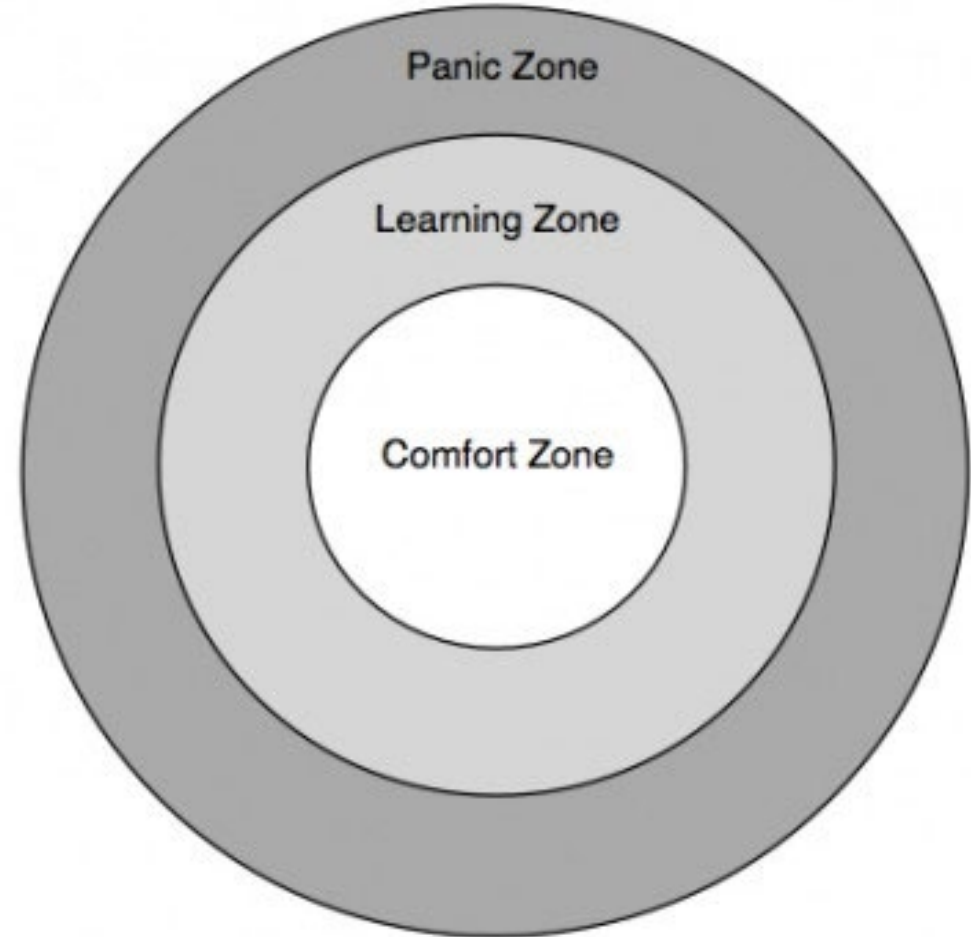

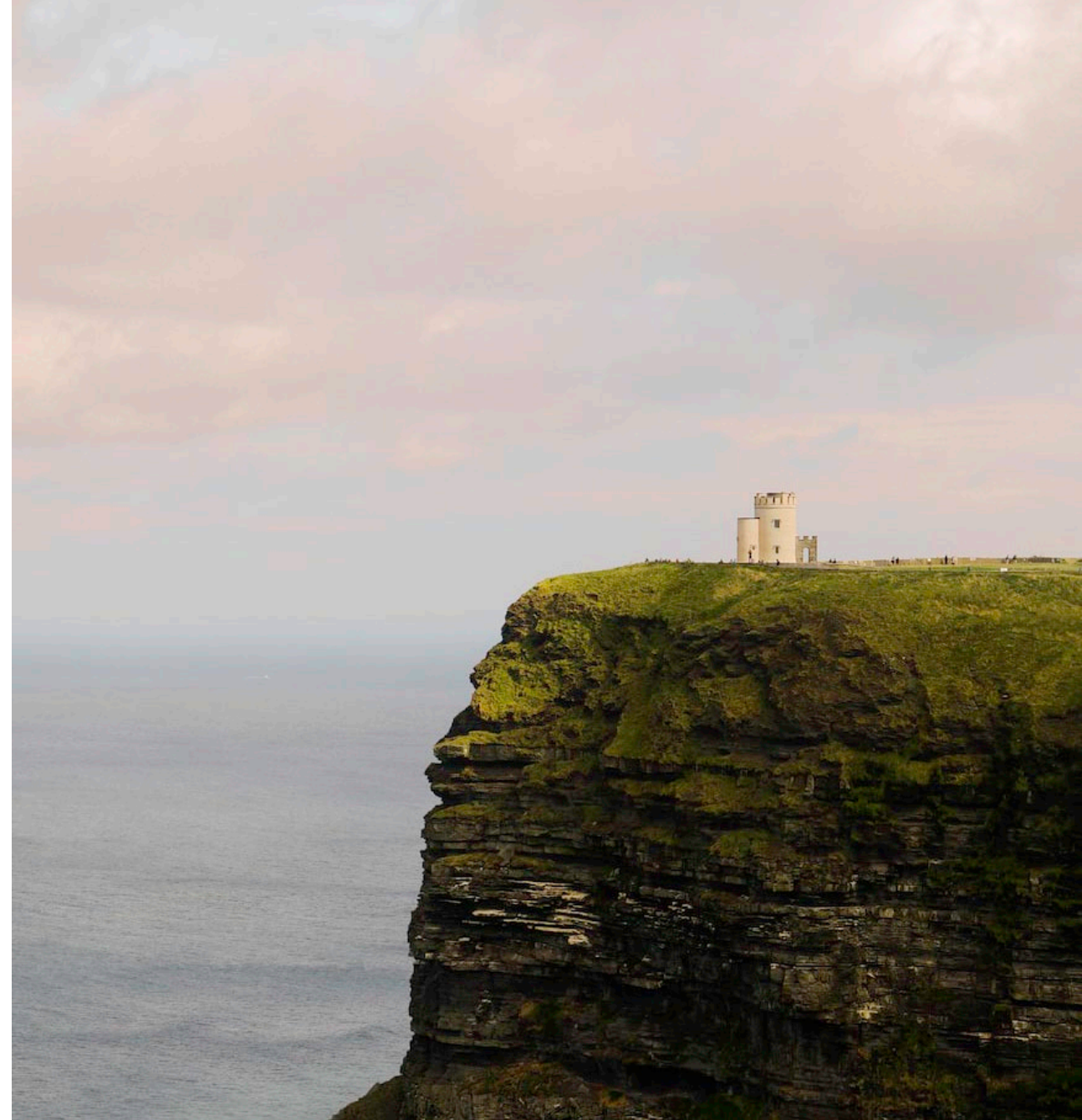

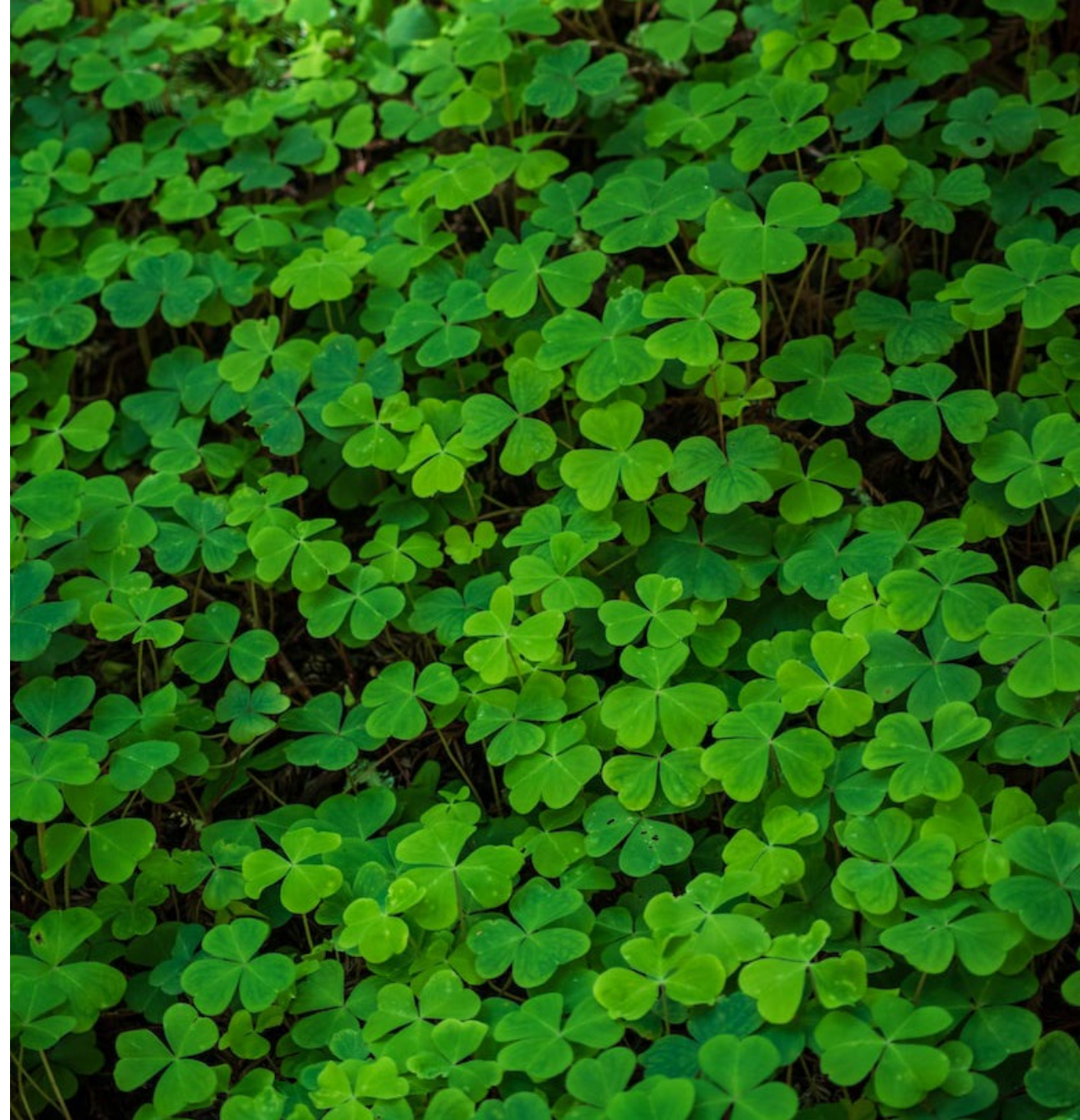

- Culture Shock Curve
- Different phases of adjustment
- Studying internationally pushes your boundaries
- Becoming comfortable outside your comfort zone



Coping with change and settling in

- Talk to new friends or to Trinity staff
- Get into a routine here
- Get support from home... but not too much - live in Ireland's time zone, not the one back home
- Take care of yourself, eat well and exercise
- Take the initiative - Go out and meet Irish people - Join college clubs and societies
- Immerse yourself in Irish life - read newspapers, watch Irish TV, social media

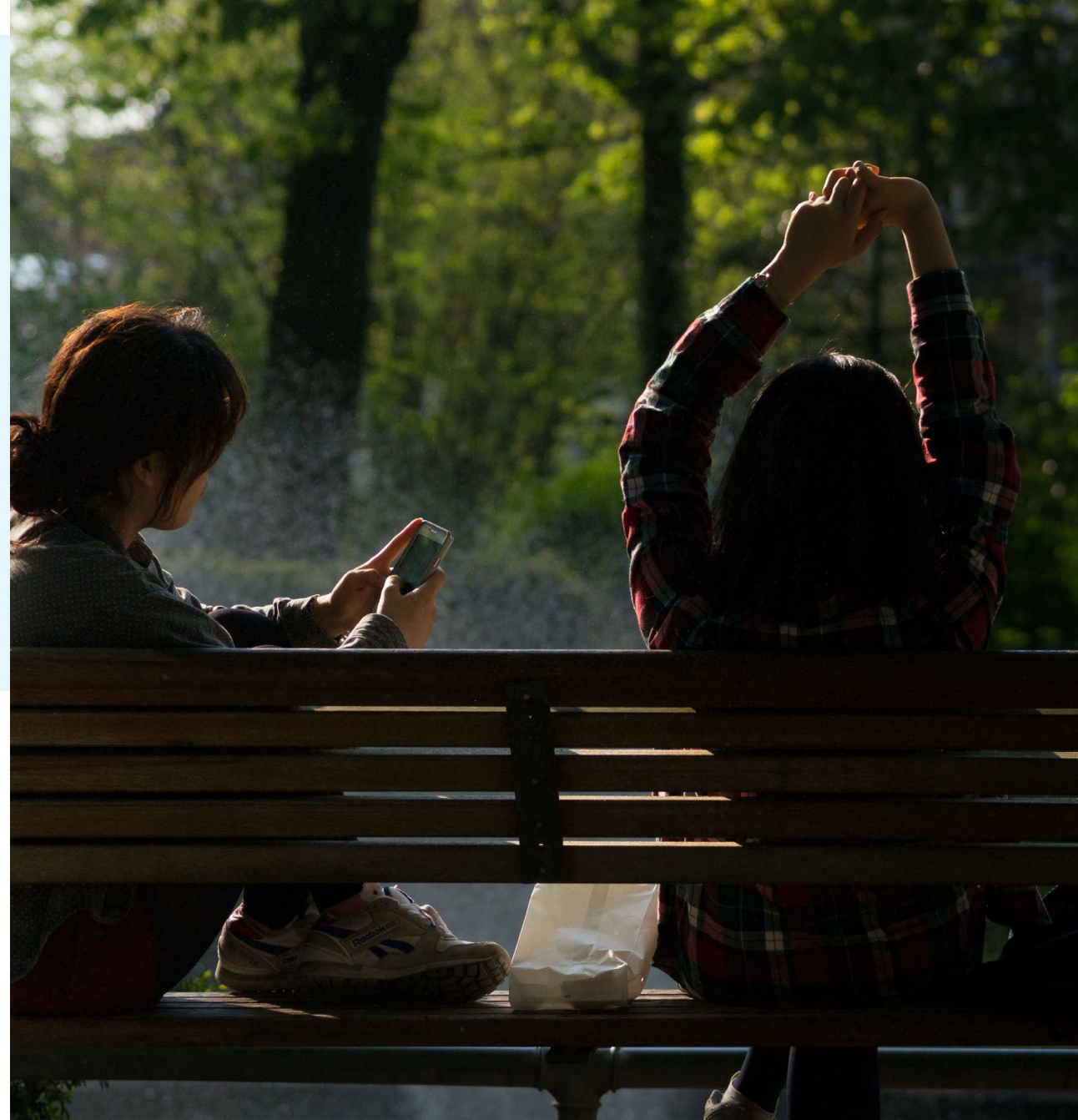

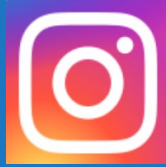
